# **Executive Summary**

#### 1. Introduction

Currently, the City of Niles expects to receive an estimated \$249,333 in funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development under the program year 2017 Community Development Block Grant Program. Funds from this program are expected to be available for the period October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2018. It is estimated that an additional \$30,000 of funds will be reprogrammed from PY16 for distribution and use during PY17.

Like many communities, Niles continues to be affected by economic stagnation and decreasing revenues. The City of Niles intends to use its CDBG allocation for verifying elimination, public facilities, code enforcement activities, public services and administration of the CDBG program. The preferred outcome for this submission of the City of Niles, Michigan's Annual Action Plan focuses on creating a safe, decent and suitable living environment for the citizens of Niles – particularly for low and moderate-income persons living within a designated Low-Moderate Income Area (LMA) within the City.

Over the past four years, the City has focused on funding projects in targeted areas. Focusing specifically on neighborhoods with schools, increased youth and/or increased numbers of ELI households, the City has provided targeted code enforcement, park, street and sidewalk improvements, owner-occupied home rehabilitation assistance, public services and technical assistance as a means of increasing the overall impact of its HUD funding, placing as many resources as possible directly into specific areas. Additionally, the City has been allocating resources for youth related services in an effort to groom economic regeneration over the next generation.

While Niles residents continue to face many interrelated social issues such as poverty; overspending on affordable housing; substandard/blighted housing; higher incidence of criminal activity; and a need for support services, we are seeing renewed community pride, especially among the youth population, as efforts to include young people in planning and program activities has developed a sense of community that may have been waning for a number of years.

#### 1. Introduction

As the lead agency, the City of Niles, Community Development Department oversaw the consultation required to complete the Annual Action Plan. As part of the recent Consolidated Planning Process, Community Development staff collaborated with a wide network of community service and housing providers, clients of those providers, government officials, business leaders, neighborhood representatives and residents. Information was gathered in a number of ways which included a Community Needs Survey, stakeholder and neighborhood forums, outreach at established community events and provider meetings. The outcomes of the Consolidated Plan and associated Annual Action Plans represent the information collected from this collaboration, as well as from public comment and public hearing opportunities.

Through regular meetings with individuals, groups, committees and consortia, the City has been working to ensure that local, County, State and Federal programs are routinely considered to meet the needs of our shared community. To maximize these efforts when groups without the capacity to seek/administer funding, make effective referrals or in-roads needed to develop and compliment effective partnerships has been welcome to seek out and receive support and guidance from the City

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Over the last few years, the City has ramped up its coordination and participation with the Berrien County Homeless Resource Network, the local chapter of the Michigan BOS COC and the VA. Through participation in regular meetings, annual PIT counts, training, and 1:1 conversations and constituent support requests, the City has learned that locally, few individuals and fewer families meet the federal definitions of homeless, but rather are at risk of becoming homeless. While the actual counts are low, the City is working with the PHA to prioritize homelessness and other at-risk categories as allowed. Additionally, we continually work to ensure that anyone presenting in the community as "homeless" receives a referral to the HARA and other homeless service agencies.

The City of Niles is only eligible for CDBG funds as an entitlement community. All ESG, HOME, HOPWA, HMIS and COC funds are administered through the State and local recommendations are considered by the State during allocation award season. The City has a vote during local allocations and utilizes that opportunity to provide input into the funding decisions. Additionally, the City employs staff with an advanced understanding of these programs.

Officers also perform curbside inspections of every structure where frequently, junk and trash violations are much more prevalent. # **AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)**

#### Introduction

The Niles Housing Commission (NHC) is a component unit of the City's hierarchy.

Founded as part of the City in the 1970s the NHC has had a varied and troubled past but has always been the only available "last chance" housing in Niles.

With over 200 households calling the NHC home each year, the survival and growth of the NHC is tantamount to local affordable housing.

Over the last two years, the City has worked hand in hand with the NHC to ensure local compliance with federal PHA mandates.

# Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Niles Housing Commission has been working with a management firm for 2 years. During this time, the quality of life for residents has increased dramatically.

Residents now have a voice through the RAB and Resident Council.

Social Service, Healthcare and Financal Literacy Programs are offered weekly through community partners.

There is onsite access to the MDHHS portal as well as the SSA's portal for benefit support.

The managment firm has been tasked with determining when the NHC could request social service support funding like Ross and other like structures.

# If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

#### Discussion

Public housing was established to provide decent and safe rental housing for eligible low-income families, the elderly, and persons with disabilities. Public housing comes in all sizes and types, from scattered single family houses to high rise apartments for elderly families. In the United States, there are approximately 1.2 million households living in public housing units, managed by about 3,300 housing authorities (HA).

The Niles Housing Commission is one these housing authorities, having been created by agreement between the City of Niles and HUD in 1972. Today, the Niles Housing Commission manages a total of 180 units – 50 single family homes scattered throughout the City and 130 apartment units located within a

six story high rise in downtown Niles.

Until recently, the Niles Housing Commission has been designated as "troubled" by HUD. Over the last three years, the City Administrator, Finance Director/City Treasurer and Community Development Director have been working with the board to meet the requirements set by HUD. Following a long period of political upheaval and managerial changes, The Niles Housing Commission now has a current strategic plan for addressing the needs of low and moderate income families and improving their living environment, as well as improving the management and operation of public housing.

The City has been working closely with the NHC to rectify administrative issues and develop operational plans, policies and standard operating procedures. The City feels strongly that the success of the NHC is important to the community and has designated affordable housing planning as an approved project during this Action year.

# AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

#### Introduction

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City is working with the Berrien County Homeless Resource Network (the locally identified COC) to determine if funding is available to support 1-2 households in obtaining shelter and/or permanent housing within the City of Niles. Additionally, the City works with the Niles Community Schools' provides support to area youth designated as homeless under US Department of Education regulations.

#### Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

All individuals and/or households who are identified as lacking a fixed place to live tonight are referred to a shelter in Benton Harbor, MI and/or South Bend, IN. Both communities are equal distances away and are accessible by public transit bus, however, the bus fare and the time it takes to get to either community on public transit are significant barriers when the crisis is happening right now at these times, the Niles Police Department or other social service entity are willing to transport. Alternatively, with notice, the Community Development Department can arrange and provide transportation to one of the shelters using public transit fairly effectively.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals

# and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City relies heavily on the COC (HRN in Berrien County) and HARA for ensuring successes for homeless persons.

There are no shelters, programs, or services available in Niles.

That said, we are working to bolster offerings by seeking projects that will be able to provide emergency support.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

While there are very few local people living on the streets (Niles Police Department indicates 1-5 people at any given time lack any residence within the City limits), there is a small number of local people in desperate need of permanent accommodations.

At these times, the City works 1:1 with individuals/households to find a permanent solution. This often includes referrals for services, education, housing, clothing, food, training, and/or other publically available resources.

#### Discussion

The City is taking a more active role in how we accommodate and support low-income households at risk of becoming homeless. While homelessness is not an apparent problem in Niles, the breadth of poverty often finds households on the brink of losing their housing and in need of support. Further discussion in the coming months with the HRN will help identify what can be done to abate or at least slow the progress of poverty in Niles.
